## Raising Meat Rabbits

- Providing feed, water and general care to 80 + rabbits two times per day
- Individual has limited mobility and back pain
- Pens are currently suspended approx. 3 feet above the ground
- Individual is not eligible for VR





## Breeding and raising sheep for 4-H projects and meat production

- Individual has low vision
- Breeding ewes are kept in this barn pen or on pasture
- Individual farms alone



# Beef Farmer

- Shoveling or pushing feed towards the cattle multiple times per day
- TBI, back pain, arthritis (hands and shoulders)
- Working with VR
