An Ethiopian Orthodox church




Misikir our host took us to meet 3 rural pastors with disabilities




We saw the beauty of the land and animal-power agricultural practices.

Walking to church in Addis wondering if there are any rural work alternatives.




Farming terrain is rugged up mountain sides and access to water is a premium.

We learned of the Lord's care for all of us and the biblical view of disability.




Project Emmanuel in Sodo hires people with disabilities to build wheelchairs.

Emmanuel staff learning to adjust footrests to minimize risk of pressure sores.




Bijaj taxis are more numerous than cars. They took us from the hotel to hospital.

Groves of trees are planted for straight poles used in all kinds of construction.




Staff from Cure Hospital and Sodo positioning a child with cerebral palsy.

Roads are shared equally by donkey carts, Bijaj taxis, livestock, and vehicles.



Flying home west from Addis Ababa we gained 8 hours, so it was a 32-hour day!



Next steps? A clear need for assistive technology services was recognized.

We are praying for wisdom to know the next steps for providing assistive technology services and developing low-tech adaptive tools for workers with disabilities. We know this with our Ethiopian partners...

- We are pulling together with Ethiopian farmers and trades people who are fully capable of providing high quality assistive technology services in their country,
- · Rural Ethiopians understand their farming systems and culture very well,
- Most Ethiopians are very social people and care for each other,
- · Many Ethiopian churches and organizations are very interested in this effort,
- Our Ethiopian partners are quick to learn and desire professional development to continue increasing their quality of service and manufacturing skills, and
- Our partners will work on a sustainable business model for this undertaking.

As decisions are made, we will let you know of more opportunities to work with our partners around Addis Ababa and Sodo and improve the likelihood of success for workers with disabilities in Ethiopia. Thank you for your prayers.
