### **General Emergency Preparedness**

1. **Do you have a written emergency plan for your farm or ranch?**
  - If yes, how often is it reviewed and updated?
2. **Do you have a list of emergency contacts (fire, medical, local authorities, etc.) readily available?**
  - Are they easily accessible, especially in remote areas?
3. **Have you identified safe evacuation routes and shelter locations for your property and livestock?**
  - Are these plans regularly practiced with all family members and workers?
4. **Do you have access to up-to-date weather information?**
  - How do you stay informed about weather conditions that could affect your operations?

### **Personal Health and Safety**

5. **Have you developed a plan for your health care needs in case of injury or illness while working?**
  - Do you have specific accommodations or adaptations in place for any health conditions?
6. **Are all workers and family members trained in first aid and CPR?**
  - Do you have a first aid kit that is well stocked and accessible?
7. **What systems do you have in place to communicate during an emergency if you are injured or incapacitated?**
  - Do you have technology (e.g., cell phones, radios, satellite phones) to stay in touch during emergencies?

## **Equipment and Technology**

8. **Do you have backup power sources (generators, batteries, etc.) for critical systems in case of power outages?**
  - How often do you test and maintain this equipment?
9. **Are your farm and ranch vehicles and machinery regularly maintained to avoid breakdowns during emergencies?**
  - Do you have spare parts and tools available for quick repairs?

## **Livestock and Animal Care**

10. **Do you have an emergency plan for livestock in case of natural disasters (e.g., flooding, fire, severe storms)?**
  - How do you plan to evacuate or shelter animals if needed?
11. **Do you have a sufficient supply of animal feed, water, and medications for emergencies?**
  - Are these supplies rotated and kept fresh?

## **Communication and Support Networks**

12. **Do you have a support network (neighbors, local organizations, government agencies) that can assist you in an emergency?**
  - How are you connected to local emergency response teams?
13. **Have you identified community resources for disaster relief, including shelters, animal rescues, and food banks?**
  - Are these resources accessible, especially if transportation becomes difficult?

## **Financial and Insurance Planning**

14. **Do you have farm insurance that covers damages from natural disasters, accidents, or other emergencies?**
  - Are you familiar with the claims process and what's covered under your policy?
15. **Have you developed a contingency plan to manage financial challenges if an emergency disrupts your operations?**
  - Do you have savings or emergency funding available?

## **Training and Education**

**16. Have you participated in any training for emergency preparedness, such as workshops or courses specific to farming and ranching?**

- Are there any additional training opportunities you could pursue?

**17. Do you have a communication plan with your employees and family to keep everyone informed in case of an emergency?**

- Are there regular meetings or discussions to review and update emergency plans?

***These questions help identify gaps in emergency preparedness and encourage farmers and ranchers to consider areas they might overlook, ensuring they are as prepared as possible for unexpected situations.***
